## worker rights under Saskatchewan's occupational health and safety legislation:

- · The right to know the hazards at work and how to control them;
- · The right to find and control workplace hazards; and
- · The right to refuse any work you believe to be unusually dangerous.

## What is the role of your OH&S committee?

Every workplace in Saskatchewan with at least 10 workers must have a worker/management occupational health committee. The committee is to:

- Conduct routine workplace inspections;
- Assist workers to ensure their OH&S concerns are appropriately handled;
- Advise and assist workers with OH&S-related policies, procedures and issues;
- Investigate when someone refuses to perform a job or task they believe is dangerous.

Your OH&S committee should be your first point of contact, but you can also call the provincial OH&S line at

## What to do if you are injured at work:

The Saskatchewan Workers' Compensation Board (WCB) can provide rehabilitation, retraining and financial assistance to people injured on the job.

If you are injured at work, get medical aid as soon as possible. Report the incident to your employer. Then fill out a worker's report of injury form and send it to the WCB.
